Happy 100th Birthday - Geoff Roberts

Geoff Roberts (KOSB) joined the army in 1942 and after training in Scotland he volunteered for Airborne Forces. He was posted to the 7th Battalion Kings Own Scottish Borderers as one of the replacements for a glider that had crashed. After Glider training at Brize Norton and on the Yorkshire moors and being briefed for several operations that were subsequently cancelled, he was one of the men who flew into The Netherlands as part of Operation Market Garden and was taken prisoner after the battle. Geoff celebrated his birthday with family and friends in Peterborough.

Geoff was awarded the MBE in the Kings birthday honours this year, very well deserved.

Hastings Air Crash 1965

On 6 July 1965 a Hastings aircraft took off from RAF Abingdon with a crew of six and 35 assorted service personnel for a parachute drop over RAF Weston on the Green.

After take-off, the pilot of the Hastings, from 36 Squadron RAF, experienced difficulties with the elevator controls.

Shortly after contacting RAF Abingdon control tower for a priority landing the aircraft climbed steeply out of control, stalled and crashed into a barley field at Little Baldon, Oxfordshire.

The aircraft burst into flames on impact and all 41 occupants on board were killed.

The passengers included eight RAF Parachute Jump Instructors; three NCOs and seven recruits from The Parachute Regiment; and a Gunner from 7th Parachute Light Regiment, Royal Horse Artillery.

At the time the accident was the third worst air disaster in the UK and resulted in the RAF grounding its entire Hastings fleet.

The subsequent investigation identified metal fatigue in the elevator attachment bolts as the cause of the crash.

A remembrance will be held as part of the Sunday service at Aldershot Garrison Church on Sunday 6 July 2025. All are welcome. We Will Remember Them




The Parachute Regiment Warrant Officers & SNCOs Dinner Club

Dementia UK

Dementia will affect one in two of us in our lifetime, whether by caring for someone with the diagnosis, developing it ourselves, or both. It is a complex, progressive condition that can be difficult to understand and too may families struggle to know where to turn to and who can answer their questions.

If you are caring for a person with dementia or concerned about potential symptoms, this session will help you understand the condition and how you and your family can live with it as well as possible. The Webinar will explore:

- The Types of dementia: Knowing what form the person is living with can help you understand what to expect and how to support them.
- Common Symptoms: From memory loss to communication difficulties to changes in personality.
- Maintaining Wellbeing: Tips to help the person with dementia and those who care for them to stay well.
- Medication: There is no cure for dementia, but for some types of dementia, medication can help with the symptoms.

Register you status with the NHS

The armed forces community should register their status with their GP.

Why does the NHS need this information?

- To understand the healthcare needs of the Armed Forces Community: Accurate coding helps the NHS build a better picture of the specific health requirements and challenges faced by this community.
- To ensure equitable access to care: Identifying individuals helps the NHS uphold the principles of the Armed Forces Covenant, which aims to ensure that members of the Armed Forces community receive the same standard of, and access to, healthcare as any other UK citizen.
- To facilitate appropriate support and treatment: Being aware of your background can help healthcare professionals provide more tailored and relevant care, and signpost you to specific support services if needed.

To enable **potential prioritization for treatment where clinically appropriate**: In line with the Armed Forces Covenant, individuals with the correct coding may, subject to clinical need, be prioritized for treatment, particularly for conditions related to service.

Codes shown below but GPs should have access to them on their systems. Our members should inform their GPs of their code and ask GPs to add the details to their medical files.

Welfare Process



It is very important that PRA Branches use the SUPPORT OUR PARAS welfare team for any cases that are reported to them.

The Welfare Team are trained to deal with these cases and will be able to identify the most suitable course of action for an individual in need.

Financial Assistance Process:

- Step 1: Contact SUPPORT OUR PARAS Welfare Team
- Once needs are established a referral will be completed to a case working organisation, RBL or SSAFA.
- An allocated caseworker will start an application for assistance, known as 'Form A'.
- Step 4: Completed Form A, and any attachments is sent electronically to military charities, including SUPPORT OUR PARAS, for consideration.
- Step 5: Successful grants are issued swiftly back to case working organisations for onward payment.
- Step 6: Urgent grants can be made on the same day if required.
- Step 7: The process is both confidential and transparent, providing an audit trail.
